





Dear Mr. Morrell:

As agreed to in our December meeting, I have looked into the above-referenced matter and have discussed it with my staff. Staff's inspection of the vessel M/V Borocho, as well as the marine surveyor's report submitted to DERM on behalf of Reef Guard on December 4th, 2023, indicate that the vessel's level of deterioration make it an unsuitable candidate for acceptance into Miami-Dade County's Artificial Reef Program. Furthermore, Miami-Dade County is unwilling to take on the liability that accepting this vessel into its artificial reef program would entail.

In light of the above, I do not recommend that Miami-Dade Reef Guard Association expend additional resources in pursuing this option.
